Report on the 49th NATS National Conference

he 49th NATS National Conference (formerly Convention), held June 30 to July 4 at the Hilton Minneapolis was attended by over 600 registrants. Conference Chairman Alison Feldt, National Program Chair Scott McCoy, Program Coordinator Dan Dressen and all committee chairs and members deserve hearty congratulations for a varied and successful conference. Living up to its name "New Directions in Song", the keynote speaker was Paul Sperry of the faculty of the Julliard School and Manhattan School of Music who gave a thought-provoking address on American Song Literature. Opening ceremony entertainment was by Karen Solgard on Hardanger fiddle with dancers Carol Sersland and Bruce Bostrum.

A master class presented by Neil Semer and Mary Saunders Barton differed from the usual in that they both worked sequentially with the same two singers on classical and non-classical styles, not knowing what the other master teacher had done with either singer.

The winner of the Art Song Competition was composer David Cutler who accompanied baritone Paul Hindemith on "Evenly Spaced Waves of Irony"-"The Willies," "Flames," "Weighing the Dog," and "Embrace" with text by U.S. Poet Laureate (2001-2003) Billy Collins. A gala opening followed with a free evening for enjoying Minneapolis.

Two pre-conference sessions on Music Theater Performance Techniques by Craig Carnelia and Voice Science Primer by Scott McCoy were well attended. There were a total of seventeen "break-out" sessions, with usually three being held at the same time. These covered musical theater (Corinne Ness), voice science (Ron Scherer), Spanish song (Suzanne Draayer), Canadian song (Caroline Schiller), alternative singing styles (Jeanette LoVetri), the private voice studio (American Academy of Teachers of Singing), the art song recital (Elizabeth Croy), women composers (D'Anna Fortunato), including Broadway (Linda Snyder and Sarah Mantel), money matters (Michael Mullins and also Sharon Szymanski), vocology (John Nix), the NATS intern program (Jean Westerman Gregg and Julie Simson), and resonance strategies of the male singer (Paul Kiesgen). In addition there were 43 NATS members who presented research poster papers covering a wide range of topics.

A research science review on "Myths and Truths in Singing Training" was given by Katherine Verdolini of the University of Pittsburgh. Swedish baritone Håkan Hagegård imparted interesting material on Staging the Art Song Recital. Jan Opalach, bass-baritone of the New York City Opera, accompanied by Ted Taylor, presented the artist recital, which included music by Griffes, Ives and Grieg as well as contemporaries Donald Martino, and J. Guy Ropartz. Soprano Sharon Mabry gave us a fine demonstration of "Contemporary Art Song: What Does It Sound Like and How Do I Do It?" Ann Baltz of OperaWorks presented a session on learning and teaching styles.

n behalf of the Board of Directors of the National Association of Teachers of Singing, Inc., I hereby issue an invitation to all NATS members, chapters, districts, and regions to submit suggestions for nominees for the national offices that will be open as of July 2007.

These offices may include those of President-Elect, Vice-President for Membership, Vice-President for Workshops, Vice-President for NATS Artists Awards, Vice-President for Discretionary Funds and Field Activities, and Secretary/Treasurer.

According to Article X Section 1 of our Bylaws "Vice presidents and the secretary/treasurer shall serve for two years and may succeed themselves once." By calling for the suggestions it is the hope of the Board of Directors that the National Nominating Committee will be able to consider several worthy candidates for the offices that will be open.

- 1. Submit the name, contact information, and NATS organizational experience of the nominee. It is strongly suggested that nominees for President-Elect have past or present experience as a member of the NATS Board of Directors. Be sure to obtain the permission from the potential candidate to submit his or her name for the two-year term of office if selected to run, and if elected by the membership. The candidate for President-Elect must be willing to serve two-year terms as President-Elect, President, and Past President, for a total of six years.
- 2. Include the names of those in your chapter, district, and/or regions that support the suggested candidate so that the nominating committee members may contact the possible nominees for a professional résumé, qualifications for the office and any additional information needed by the committee.
- 3. Send these materials to Jane Dillard, Chair, NATS Nominating Committee, 9719 Chestnut Road, Waxhaw, NC 28173 by February 1, 2007.

The National Nominating Committee, (Jane Dillard, Sharon Szymanski, Charles Peterson, Paul Piersall, Jan Douglas, and Margaret Dehning) will select one candidate for each open office subject to approval at the 2007 NATS Board of Directors meeting. Prior to the election, the slate of candidates will be published in *Inter Nos* and NATS Online.

Your participation in this nominating process is an essential part of electing national officers.

THE 2006 NATS INTERN PROGRAM UNIVERSITY OF MISSOURI-KANSAS CITY, JUNE 13-23, 2006

Reflections submitted by Matt Hoch, Shorter College, NATS Intern

Imagine most musicians hunger for collegiality; a relationship with others that fosters exchange, learning, and strength of common purpose. The NATS Intern program is a strong example (in a sometimes cynical world) of how this atmosphere can be created and nourished. The intense, high level information coupled with the positive and eager spirit of Master Teachers, staff, and fellow interns blended into an experience that I'll still be unpacking and evaluating for months and years to come. Almost like a teaching ensemble, the group who met in Kansas City collaborated in ways large and small to impact my studio and classroom teaching, my own singing, and my musicianship." This 'gap' in my training was—at long last—filled at the 2006 NATS Intern Program at the University of Missouri-Kansas City. Lasting for only ten brief days, the 2006 NATS Intern Program was a Utopian existence for twelve promising young artist-teachers. Apprenticed to four of the nation's most accomplished, esteemed, and seasoned voice teachers, the program offered what many of us had desired for years: the opportunity to refine our skills while being surrounded by warm and supportive colleagues mutually devoted to the art of voice teaching.

"What I enjoyed most about the program was the opportunity to meet teachers my own age. In our first job we are often the 'young' person on the faculty, or the only one in voice, and there is a certain feeling of isolation, both academically and socially. This program helped me understand where I need to improve, and where I can, offer something different or something special to my employer." Anthony Radford

Under the skillful direction of NATS President Jane Dillard and co-hosts Rebecca Sherburn and Raymond Feener, the twelve interns were each apprenticed to one of four Master Teachers: James McDonald, Lorraine Manz, Stephanie Samaras, and Donald Simonson. I know that I speak for all of the interns when I say that we were overwhelmed not only by the competency of our mentors, but their generous spirits as well. Each was truly interested in seeing us succeed in every way, and I cannot imagine a more supportive and positive environment than the one that was provided for us throughout the program.

The program was designed to create an environment of openness and trust between the Interns and Master Teachers so that ideas could be shared and discussed freely. Individual styles and approaches were respected and encouraged. It was

especially wonderful to have had four Master Teachers who demonstrated such a wide variety of teaching styles and personalities. I felt encouraged to be myself and keep my own style while also soaking in the ideas of the Master Teachers as well as my fellow Interns." Janelle DeStefano

The collegial relationship that quickly blossomed between the interns was perhaps the most beautiful aspect of the program. We were continually inspired by each other and developed friendships that would last for many years to come. This fondness was also closely accompanied by the deep respect that we maintained for one another, both personally and professionally. I was inspired by the things that made each Intern special—the drive, the technique, the voice, the sensitivity to students, the ability to think outside the box, and most of all, the openness they had toward one another." While our mornings consisted of teaching and pedagogical discussion, our afternoons and evenings were filled with master classes and lectures related to the art of teaching. Each of the four Master Teachers offered both a master class and a lecture on a topic of their specialty, providing eight of the eleven sessions. James McDonald addressed German diction; Lorraine Manz introduced the Otto B. Schloepfe Vocal Arts Center at Oberlin; Stephanie Samaras discussed the application of classical technique to popular singing; and Donald Simonson presented a lecture on the singer's formants.

In addition, another three sessions were also presented by guest speakers: Past-President of NATS Jean Westerman Gregg, CCC-SLP discussed vocal health and pedagogy; Dr. Randal Pembroke, Dean of the UMKC Conservatory, gave an informative lecture on tenure and promotion in academia; and Dr. Charles Robinson, Professor of Music at UMKC gave an inspiring lecture on the meaning of music in our lives as teachers.

The recitals devoted to "New Vocal Repertoire" were definitely two of the most popular events of the 2006 program. Vocal Literature Liaison Cynthia Vaughn brilliantly secured the donation of thousands of dollars worth of freshly published vocal repertoire to be kept and used in the personal studios of the twelve interns. The interns performed this music for the public, accompanied by outstanding pianist Lamar Sims. The generous publishers included Hal Leonard, Classical Vocal Repertoire, Alfred Publishing, Schirmer, W. W. Norton & Company, and many individual composers. We will cherish their donations for many years to come!

The new literature reading sessions offered us the chance to sing and hear unknown or lesser-known repertoire in a relaxed setting. The piles of music we each received from various publishers was so generous, it felt like Christmas in June! Thank you, Cynthia Vaughn!" Kristine Hurst-Wajszczuk

The success of any NATS Intern Program is due to the organization of the program by its director, NATS Past-President, and to the local site coordinator or coordinators who work tirelessly planning, arranging, and overseeing all aspects of the operation of the program at the designated site. The site coordinators for 2006 were UMKC faculty and former interns Rebecca Sherburn and Raymond Feener. Their organizational skills and their many hours of service to the overseeing of operational details throughout the entire session are to be commended. President Jane Dillard served as acting director for Past-President, Roy Delp, the 2006 Intern Director.

On the final day, as we watched our students perform and realized how much they—and we—had grown over the past ten days, there was a tremendous sense of personal and

professional fulfillment from all involved. And more important, we were <u>grateful</u> for what we had been through. We are indebted to our students, our colleagues, our Master Teachers, and the program presenters and administrators for everything that they provided for us so that we could not only become better teachers, but better people as well.

So, on behalf of all of the participants in the 2006 NATS Internship, I would like to extend a warm <u>THANK YOU</u> to NATS for making this experience possible. Words cannot express our sincere appreciation.

The NATS Intern Program is an exciting and innovative venture that seeks to pair experienced and recognized master teachers of voice with talented young members of NATS. Within a format designed to promote the dynamic exchange of ideas and techniques, the goal is to improve substantially the studio teaching skills of these promising young teachers. Each intern will teach four lessons to two students (one male and one female) and perform in a master class under the supervision of a master teacher. In addition, the master teachers, our vocal literature liaison, Cynthia Vaughn, and special guests will present special lectures and demonstrations. Interns chosen will be responsible for their own expenses, although financial assistance will be available through the NATS Foundation for housing and meals. Interns may also request financial assistance from their NATS chapters or regions as well as from their institutions of employment for travel. The interns' tuition expenses for this program are completely covered by NATS, Inc., and the NATS Foundation. Again this year, one of the master teachers will specialize in the needs of the private studio teacher including teaching non-classical styles and three interns who specialize in private studio teaching will be selected to work with that master teacher.

Twelve NATS teachers will be chosen to participate in the 2007 NATS Intern Program.

Requirements are as follows:

- An applicant must be a member of NATS in good standing with no more than five years of
 full-time teaching or the part-time equivalent. Working as a graduate teaching assistant does
 not count towards the five-year limit. Holding a Master's Degree or higher is preferable but
 not required.
- The application must include the completed application form (available in a downloadable version at www.nats.org, in the Fall 2006 *Inter Nos*, or by mail from NATS, Inc., 4745 Sutton Park Court, Suite 201, Jacksonville, FL 32224), a résumé, two letters of recommendation, and a recent audio recording (a 15-minute audio CD of your singing with piano accompaniment in three languages including English. Private studio teachers should include at least one non-classical song. If you cannot send a CD, a cassette-taped recording is acceptable). Applicants must not send video recordings.
- All applications must be sent by February 1, 2007 (postmark deadline).

In addition to being leaders in the formation of P-NATS/SAGUPA, Ronan Ferrer, Eugene de los Santos and Nenen Espina are among the most influential musicians in their country where they enjoy busy lives as teachers and performers. They had hoped to join us for the Minneapolis conference but unhappily the American Embassy denied them visas.

MEET MA. AUSTREGELINA (NENEN) ESPINA-ALFORNAN

Nenen earned a magna cum laude grade for the Masters in Voice degree from the University of Santo Tomas in Manila. She received her Bachelors of Music degree from St. Scholastica's College and also has a diploma in Voice from the Hong Kong Royal Academy. Growing up in a large family, she was constantly surrounded by music and the arts and this led the way to her active career as a teacher and singer.

She made her debut at 17 when she was chosen to be a soloist with the Philippine Philharmonic Orchestra. Since then she has been heard with the Singapore Chamber Orchestra, the Hong Kong Academy Orchestra, The Manila Symphony Orchestra and has appeared as a soloist at all of the major concert series in the Philippines. Her roles include Santuzza, Rosina, Dorabella, Suzuki and Marcelina.

She is chair of the voice department at St.Scholastica's College and also teaches at the University of Santo Tomas. She and her sister, pianist Mary Anne, are dedicated to bringing music to a wider audience in their country and to encourage adequate government support for the arts.

Full or Associate NATS Members can easily start a SNATS chapter. You'll need five students to begin. Students do not have to be affiliated with a college or university. Indeed, teachers may start SNATS chapters with their home studios and may include any age group they deem appropriate. This is a great opportunity for those with home studios to have a weekly or monthly meeting of all of their students to discuss whatever vocal issues are pertinent to the group.

Finally, through the beneficence of the NATS Foundation, each new chapter will receive a free one-year subscription to

the Journal of Singing. The Journal can offer many opportunities for discussion among your group members.

I was proud to meet many SNATS members at the Minneapolis conference. Indeed, for the first time SNATS had its own booth at the conference. The booth was manned by these SNATS members: Sarah Daughtrey, Joe Gapko, Brian Manternach, Jeremy Manternach, and Heather Winter. It was Sarah Daughtrey who designed the SNATS logo (above) and the new SNATS brochure.

We were so sorry to learn of the passing of Joe Gapko shortly after the conference.

In addition, each of these young artists exhibited cordial and professional conduct toward their colleagues, accompanists, judges, and audition personnel during all rehearsals, warm-ups and performances. Serving them as coordinator was a rewarding personal experience.

NATSAA Vice president Paul Kiesgen superbly administered the 39th Artist Awards Competition having already done the lion's share of meticulous work with the applications from over 300 singers. Incoming NATSAA Vice President Don Simonson skillfully assisted Paul Kiesgen. From 10:00 am until 5:00 pm on July 1st, the singers were expertly judged by James Doing, Lynn Helding, Eric Howe, Mary Ann Hart and Jo Ella Todd in the semifinals. The judges adhered to the audition schedule and the six finalists Emily Douglass, Quinn Patrick, Danielle Talamantes, Michelle Trainor, Kriss Anne Weiss, and Holly Wrensch were announced at 5:30pm.

The hard working team of volunteers from the Wisconsin Chapter, Julie Cross, Diane Foust, Kristine Hurst-Wajszczuk, Ruth Horrall, Tanya Kruse, Christine O'Meally, Kathy Otterson, Mitra Sadeghpour, Jean Saladino, Patty Weis, Tom Weis, and Eva Wright were door monitors, page turners, runners, and worked at the NATSAA registration table. Executive Director Kandie Smith, Executive Office Manager Deborah Guess, and Conference Chair Alison Feldt assisted with scheduling rehearsals.

Paul Kiesgen assembled an exceptional panel of judges for the finals consisting of Dale Johnson, Sharon Mabry, Elizabeth Mannion, Julie Simson, and Clifton Ware. Prior to the conference, the singers had sent in a list of selections (fifteen minutes) for the finals and their selections were printed in the program. The finalist sang beautifully and the judges were clear with their decisions. Danielle Talamantes also won the Most Promising Singer: Dorothy Kirsten-James Browning Award, a \$2500 Winners Recital for National Convention Award and a New York Solo Recital Debut in Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall produced by MidAmerica Productions with \$2500 towards expenses for the recital.

In Minneapolis, what could be more appropriate than a Nordic Art Song Recital with music from Norway, Denmark, Sweden, and Finland, by sopranos Marla Fogderud and Tracey Gorman, tenor Dan Dressen, baritone Peter Halverson and pianist Sonja Thompson?

The 2004 NATSAA winner, soprano Marcia Porter with pianist Lynn Kompass presented music of Fanny Hensel, Debussy, and in keeping with the theme of the Conference, six songs by American composers, and a set of five African-Brazilian songs arranged by Ernani Braga.

Robert Edwin, retiring Secretary-Treasurer of NATS, was the entertaining toastmaster for the banquet which was held on the evening of July 3 with music for dancing by Steve Yeager and Friends. The closing ceremony saw President Jane Dillard present the gavel (carved in 1900 by Walter Allen Stultz, 5th President, who presented it to NATS at the 1951 Chicago Convention) to President-Elect Martha Randall followed by the singing of Auld Lang Syne.

For the first time, NATS and the NATS Foundation sponsored the Young Leader Awards, which allowed seven young NATS teachers: Jon F. Clements, Janelle DeStefano, Margaret A. THE NATS FOUNDATION ANNOUNCES AWARDS FOR VOCAL EXCELLENCE

For 2007 Awards

The Awards for Vocal Excellence is a program of voice scholarships sponsored by the National Association of Teachers of Singing Foundation offered to qualified four-year colleges, universities, or conservatories with outstanding vocal programs. To be eligible to apply, the institution must meet the following guidelines:

- 1. The majority of voice teachers on the faculty must be NATS members in good standing.
- 2. The undergraduate voice curriculum must include private lessons, singer's diction, pedagogy, song literature classes, opera theatre, and a diversity of performance opportunities.
- 3. The institution must agree to match a Foundation award of \$750 with a like amount in funds or tuition grants.
- 4. The award shall be for one year and shall go to a senior voice major who has at least two semesters remaining before graduation.
- 5. The recipient must be selected by the voice faculty of the institution.
- 6. Applications must come from the dean, chair of the music department, or chair of the voice faculty. <u>Students are not eligible to apply.</u>

Note: The Application Deadline for 2007 Awards is February 15, 2007. Applications must be postmarked by February 15, 2007.

The 2006 NATS Art Song Composition Competition Award results were officially released at the 49th national conference in Minneapolis. ASCA Chair and Coordinator Carol Mikkelsen worked with a dedicated team (Lucinda Schultz & T.N. Retif, Screening Committee; Timothy Hoekman, Judith Nicosia & Yvonne Dechance, Semi-Finals Judges; noted composer Stephen Paulas, Finals Judge) for months as submissions were carefully screened and reviewed before a winner was ultimately selected.

The 1st-Place Winner and recipient of a \$1,000 prize was David Cutler of Pittsburgh, PA (www.trunkmusic. org; cutler@trunkmusic.org). He and collaborating artist Paul Hindemith, baritone, performed

the new work at the national conference on June 30th for over 600 attendees. Cutler's song cycle, *Evenly Spaced Waves of Irony* for baritone & piano, uses texts of Billy Collins, U.S. Poet Laureate 2001-2003. The four songs in the cycle are "The Willies", "Flames", "Weighing the Dog", and "Embrace".

The 2nd-Place Winner and recipient of a \$500 prize was Karim Al-Zand of Houston, Texas (www.alzand.com; alzand@rice.edu). His winning cycle is entitled *The Secret of Your Heart*, Love songs on texts of Rabindranath Tagore for mezzo-soprano and piano. The six movements of the cycle are "Do not keep to yourself", "When the two sisters go to fetch water", "He whispered, my love", "Then finish the last song", "My songs are like bees", and "My heart, the bird of the wilderness".
