ASSOCIATION NOTES

Organizational Rhyme and Reason



uestions regarding regions, districts, and chapters are frequent enough to warrant a short refresher course in how NATS is structured. If this topic is too boring to read right now, save the column for future reference! Past President Roy Delp explained this to me during my first term as Vice President for Membership, and only then did I finally understand NATS' structure and its strength in its flexibility.

NATS is divided into fourteen regions, as determined by the Board, which also determines the subdivision of each region into districts. The Board approves requests for the establishment of chapters. {Article IX, Section 1. (d) and (e)} The confusion arises because the district and the chapter can share the same geographic area AND the same name. Many chapters and districts are named for states, such as the Michigan Chapter; the same geographic area is also the district and is the Michigan District. Some states are too large for such a configuration: Texas is in the Texoma Region, but is itself not a district. Texas is divided into the West Texas District, the North Texas District, and the South Texas District. Each of those districts has two chapters.

Those of us who live in the smaller states find it convenient to speak of the "state" chapter, but that is not accurate: NATS has no state chapters or districts. Canada does not have states, but rather provinces, another instance where "state" does not apply and another reason why our Bylaws speak of districts and not states. Some districts which follow state boundaries have several chapters: the Illinois District has the Central Illinois Chapter and the Chicago Chapter within it.

Chapters can be established by any group of NATS members by petitioning the Board, which promptly considers and approves their charters. Chapters and Regions elect their officers and have their own bylaws, as long as they are consistent with the Bylaws of the Association. The only officers in NATS that are not elected by the members are the district governors. District governors are appointed by the regional governors, and their primary duty is to run NATSAA, though they help the chapter presidents as well and serve as a liaison with the regional governors. Very often the chapters will recommend past chapter presidents to the regional governors for consideration for district governor. In some cases, the same person serves as both chapter president and district governor, though this is a very big job.

Regional Governors are being asked to check the list of chapters within each region to make sure that the chapter name being used is the one that the Executive Office has on record. Does your chapter have bylaws? If not, could you help write them? Does your chapter have regular elections for officers? If not, could you suggest it? If you are in a remote area and find it difficult to travel long distances to NATS events, would you like to establish a chapter to have more frequent activities? This is entirely possible to accomplish.

The structure of NATS is not an end in itself; it is simply the tool we use to facilitate our work and to help us fulfill our desire to be the best teachers we can be. As I prepare to pass the gavel to my successor, Scott McCoy, I want the operation of NATS to be as smooth and tidy as possible. With a name like Martha, how could I do otherwise?

FIELD NOTES

Discretionary Funds

appy New Year! And with that greeting I send you an opportunity to apply for discretionary funds to fund your chapter and regional activities for 2008. I am happy to report that the NATS Board decided to increase the maximum grant amount to \$600 starting January 1, 2008.

NATS discretionary funds are intended to assist NATS chapters and regions in sponsoring master classes, lectures, recitals, workshops, and other activities that enrich the professional life of students and teachers. Preference will be given to requests from organizations that have not previously received NATS discretionary funds and those sponsoring groups for whom NATS discretionary funds will permit the offering of quality events not otherwise possible. Amounts of up to \$600 are given. Those grant requests over \$150 must be matched by funding from local sources. Only Regional Governors and Presidents may file applications. Applications,

guidelines, and expense vouchers are available online at www.nats.org.

The Board of Directors spent some time discussing several items relative to discretionary funds at its annual meeting in Jacksonville at the end of June. As a result, several philosophical decisions were made.

- Discretionary funds cannot be used as prize money in song competitions.
 Exceptions could be made to help a brand new chapter get started or in some extreme emergency situation. These decisions would be at the discretion of the Vice President for Discretionary Funds and Field Activities.
- As of January 1, 2008, the maximum amount awarded will be raised to \$600 from the current \$500.
- Receipts MUST be submitted along with the expense voucher. Requests for monies without receipts to support the voucher will be denied. NATS must carefully account for the money it spends.
- To more equitably distribute the funds, groups that apply for funding for the same event year after year will be funded only if there are monies left at the end of the fiscal year (December 31).

So far this year, grants have been promised to eight of our regions. There is still plenty of money left, so plan your projects now and apply early before the money is gone.

We now have fifty-two SNATS chapters, seven more than we had six months ago. To the SNATS students and their advisors out there, thank you for your continuing hard work! Please keep me informed of what is hap-

pening in your chapter. Even if you think that the event is "small," it is important because it's yours! Do feel free to invite me to attend your events: while I will only be able to get to a few each year, I feel that it is important for me to get to know you and for me to be one of your SNATS group's representatives of NATS.

Full or Associate NATS Members can easily start a SNATS chapter. You'll need five students to begin. Students do not have to be affiliated with a college or university. Indeed, teachers may start SNATS chapters with their home studios and may include any age group they deem appropriate. This is a great opportunity for those with home studios to have a weekly or monthly meeting of all of their students to discuss whatever vocal issues are pertinent to the group.

Also, through the beneficence of the NATS Foundation, each new chapter will receive a free one-year subscription to the *Journal of Singing*. The *Journal* can offer many opportunities for discussion among your group members.

Westminister Choir College of Rider University SNATS chapter's fall membership drive DOUBLED their chapter's membership. They have taken a tour of the Bodies exhibit and a backstage tour of the Metropolitan Opera. Ithaca SNATS has been studying Feldenkrais and recently hosted a special workshop: "What Not to Wear: SNATS Style." This workshop dealt with appropriate attire for performances and auditions.

Brenau University SNATS members attended Cobb Energy Performing Arts Centre for the Atlanta Opera's production of *Turandot*.

Central Ohio SNATS (Buckeye SNATS) upcoming events include a kick-off party in the new vocal pedagogy lab and talks with Christopher Purdy, local authority on anything opera.

Penn State SNATS reports that they are planning workshops on the Alexander Technique and how it can help singers; coaching - what it involves, how it differs from the voice teacher (demonstrations included); and healthy belting.

Virginia Tech SNATS hosted a master class with professional soprano soloist, Elizabeth Weigle. Ms. Weigle visited the campus and worked with five singers on a variety of repertoire. This was their first semester as a chapter.

University of Wisconsin SNATS presented a master class featuring John DeHaan and will be attending a masterclass being given by Paul Kiesgen on Resonance Strategies for the Male Voice at the Spring Wisconsin-NATS Chapter meeting in Madison.

University of Akron SNATS sold music t-shirts and flowers to raise money for their chapter. A particularly enjoyable fundraiser involved several faculty members, including SNATS advisor Dr. Laurie Lashbrook, dressing up for a Halloween fundraiser. Students were given the opportunity to vote for their favorite costumed faculty member. All of these events raised awareness for the organization. The group was able to work on Alexander Technique and take a trip to Chicago to see the Chicago Lyric Opera's production of *Mozart's Così fan tutte*.

I would like to remind all SNATS chapters and their advisors that the NATS Board has made available \$2,000 to be used for grant money for SNATS chapters. Information about these grants, guidelines, and applications are available online at www.nats.org/snats/snats_grants.php.

This year's conference features sessions by **Dawn Upshaw**, who will also present the Artist Recital at the wonderful Ryman Auditorium (original home of the *Grand ole Opry*), and **Sherrill Milnes**, who is the keynote speaker for our gala opening ceremony.

Two sessions called *Stepping on Stage* are scheduled, featuring prominent figures from the opera and commercial music profes-

sional communities. Each panel will present an overview of the current standards and expectations for careers "in the business." Afterward, several aspiring singers will have the opportunity to present

"practice auditions" for the panel, receiving feedback on areas of strength and things that need improvement.

Applications for people wishing to participate in these classes are now being accepted

through the conference registration website at www.nats.org NATS members may nominate their students or themselves for consideration. Singers selected to participate will be notified well in advance of the con-

Congratulations to the 2007 Van L. Lawrence Award Winner

athrynn Banres-Burroughs, DMA, Associate Professor of Music, Texas Tech University School of Music, was awarded the Van L. Lawrence Fellowhsip for 2007, and to attend the Voice Foundation's 36th Annual Symposium. Dr. Barnes-Burroughs is currently serving as President of the Texas Panhandle NATS Chapter and chair of the national NATS pedagogy committee.

Dr. Barnes-Burroughs enjoys her present appointment to the faculty of Texas Tech University School of Music as Associate Professor of Music in Voice and Opera. She currently serves as founding coordinator of The Texas Tech Voice Alliance: A Multi-disciplinary Research Intiative for faculty, undergraduate, and graduate researchers; Faculty Advisor of the newly formed student organization Associated Voice Scholars; Coordinator of The Annual TTU Voice Symposium presenting Professor Richard Miller in 2007, Robert Thayer Sataloff, M.D., D.M.A., F.A.C.S. in 2006, and Dr. Thomas F. Cleveland in 2005; and creating director of new instruction in graduate programs (MM, DMA, and PhD) in Voice with concentration in Voice Science and Pedagory. As an adjunct to her teaching, she mentors for both the Honor's College Undergraduate Research Fellow program and the TTU Teaching, Learning, and Technology Center's graduate teaching enhancement program. Her collaborative research with colleagues and students, presented regularly at the Voice Foundation's Annual Interntional Symposium: Care of the Professional Voice, can be read in six recent articles as published in the Journal of Voice.

The Van L. Lawrence Fellowship was created to honor Van L. Lawrence, M.D. for his outstanding contribution to voice, and particularly to recognize the importance of the interdisciplinary education he fostered among laryngolo-

gists and singing teachers. It is awarded jointly by The Voice Foundation and The National Association of Teachers of Singing Foundation. The Fellowship is intended to provide opportunities for the Fellow to become more thoroughly acquainted with practices, techniques, technology, and people involved in laryngology and voice science. It is hoped that the opportunities and contacts provided through the Fellowship experience will enhance the teacher's ability to do meaningful interdisciplinary

research, and will encourage the teacher to apply appropriate voice science advances in the studio. Candidates for the Van L. Lawrence Fellowship shall be members of The National Association of Teachers of Singing who are actively engaged in teaching. The Fellowship shall be awarded to candidates who have demonstrated excellence in their professions as singing teachers, and who have shown interest in and knowledge of voice science.

reetings! As I enter my last six months of a four-year term as your Vice President for Membership, a communication to you on membership policies seems in order!

On Numbers:

For some years, your Executive Board has been seeking to "broaden the tent" and increase NATS national membership. The underlying philosophy is a good one -- with a larger membership we can be more effective in speaking for the Vocal Arts as a part of our culture, and we can disseminate information on latest trends and activities in the vocal worlds of pedagogy, repertoire, performance practice, and student career-mentoring to name only a few.

Through the years our total membership has grown steadily but slowly. Recent membership efforts however, seem to be paying off! As of Feb. 1 NATS has 6587 national members (755 of those still need to pay 2008 dues -are you one of those?) - over 500 members more than this time last year!! This is indeed an improvement over past years, in which net gains have hovered at about 200 members yearly. We gain a large number of new members each year, but as you see, a rather large number of former members fail to renew their memberships; hence we have experienced slow total growth. The good news is that our recent "amnesty" program to reclaim lapsed members from 2006-7 resulted in 112 of our membership re-joining for 2008! As many of

you know, our Executive Office staff is facilitating a longer, steadier campaign by regions and chapters to contact former members and urge them to join us once again! Clearly we are beginning to see some success in this effort also! NATS has more to offer its members than ever, not the least of which is the exciting 2008 Conference in Nashville this June, so we have every reason to urge our colleagues and friends to become a part of the important work we do together.

On Application Requirements:

For many years it has been the policy of NATS not to accept years spent as a teaching associate in graduate school as counting in the two-year experience requirement for new members. Increasingly I see new applicants (particularly new DMAs) including this time in their list of "previous experience" and in some cases, it makes a difference as to whether the applicant can be admitted at the Full or Associate membership level. This policy is not clearly stated on our application form and we want to be sure it reflects what the membership feels is important. The required two years of teaching 6 or more students is a sort of an "internship" many feel, and should be kept, but more clearly articulated to applicants. The point can be made however, that many GTAs receive very solid experience teaching voice majors in our colleges and universities, and that this experience may surpass what they might have in beginning private settings. No change can be made without a change in the Bylaws, but I am asking your consideration of this policy for possible future action. Please communicate your comments to me or a member of the Membership Committee (Linda Poetschke, Darryl Edwards, Michelle Martin, Leslie Holmes, Kathy Ludowise).


