NEW DIRECTIONS

he Board of Directors of NATS annually devotes considerable time in their meetings to futures planning. Whether the topic is budgetary or programmatic, this group of individuals is devoted to the vigorous and open discussion necessary to move a member driven organization such as NATS forward and increase the value of membership. Such was the case this past summer when the Board approved two major initiatives that will have significant future impact.

The first initiative, **converting to a 501(c) 3 non-profit corporation**, affects the way NATS does business. Since its inception, NATS has been recognized by the IRS as a 501(c) 6 non-profit corporation. This designation has provided increasingly limited benefits to NATS. Most significantly, it has prevented NATS from applying for support from many grant-making organizations. With the assistance of legal counsel, NATS recently submitted a change of status application to the IRS that will provide blanket exemption to the entire national organization, including current and future chapters that elect to participate. It is estimated, that this change alone will save the executive office over \$20,000 annually in exempt sales and property taxes! We anticipate a final determination letter from the IRS in early spring.

The second initiative, **a new website**, has been in development for nearly six months. The new site is much more interactive and provides a new platform in which members can interact with one another. It will also provide a more effective way for members to find out about events at ALL levels. With the new website there are also new email addresses for all staff and officers. These are listed in this issue of *Inter Nos* and in every issue of *Journal of Singing*. As you explore the new site you will find some new features:

Member Forums

Members have often desired more interaction with colleagues on a host of relevant topics. This new area will host topical forums so that members with particular interests can discuss topics of concern. Each forum will have a NATS member serving as moderator. We are currently seeking volunteers to serve as moderators. If you are willing to serve or want to suggest a new forum topic, email Allen Henderson at allen@nats.org.

Supporting NATS Through Our Partners

Signing on the First Time

When visiting the new site for the first time, members should enter their USERNAME (NATS Member Number) and password (the initial password is the member's last name in capital letters). If your last name is less than six characters, you must change your password to six characters or more after you log in for the first time-please do this after you login for the first time OR you won't be able to login again for your second visit. After logging the member only portion of the site click on the profile link to update your membership profile. Members can also change their password in this area of the site. Members can customize their profile by uploading their photo and adding other personal information. Once the photo is uploaded it will be reviewed prior to being activated for viewing. Members will receive an automated email to confirm their photo has been uploaded.

Voluntary Teacher Database

Members who listed their information in the Voluntary Teacher Database on the old website will need to reactivate and update their profile for activation. When updating a profile, check the box "share profile" and the profile will be included in the searchable teacher database available to anyone searching for a teacher. Members can add significant information regarding private studios including linking to their personal website.

These and other features will help you as a NATS member be more connected with other members and the work of your association than ever before. As always, we welcome comments on the website or other issues of concern. Send your comments to info@nats.org.



FIELD NOTES

Discretionary Funds

Icertainly enjoy working with so many of you to arrange for Discretionary Funds for your worthwhile events. I just wish that I had more money to share.

By way of reminder, NATS discretionary funds are intended to assist NATS chapters and regions in sponsoring master classes, lectures, recitals, workshops, and other activities that enrich the professional life of students and teachers. They are not intended to be used as prize money for student auditions. Amounts of up to \$600 are given. Those grant requests over \$150 must be matched by funding from local sources. Only Regional Governors and Presidents may file applications. Applications and expense vouchers are available online and should be submitted online.

Finally, do understand that these grants are intended as a financial back up for your group, that is, we hope that your event will be a money maker and that our grant will not need to be given. So, if your event breaks even or makes some money, your grant money will be used for another waiting group.

I have taken especial pains this year to secure receipts for each and every expenditure associated with the submitted expense vouchers. While this has made the process a bit more cumbersome for the individuals submitting expense vouchers to me, I feel that it is an important step in keeping our record keeping accurate. Furthermore, this paperwork must be completed no later than six

weeks after your event, and, in all cases, no later than November 30, whichever comes first.

In 2008, grants from Discretionary Funds were awarded to these groups, representing twelve of our fourteen regions:

- The Northwest Region received three grants: a master class with Thomas Bagwell, a Scandinavian Art Song Festival, and a master class with Marvin Keenze.
- Great Lakes received three grants: a workshop with Jeannette LoVetri, a master class with Jeff Norris, and a master class with Paul Sperry.
- Mid-Atlantic received three grants: a masterclass with Clifton Ware; a workshop on body mapping, yoga, and Feldenkrais; and a master class with Mary Saunders.
- Cal-Western received two grants: a presentation by Babette Lightner and help with their annual student auditions.
- Mid-South received two grants: a workshop on classical crossover with Joy Hermalyn and help with their regional conference.
- North Central received two grants: a workshop on Male Singers and a workshop with Suzanne Draayer.
- Intermountain received two grants: help with travel for student auditions and for a clinician to travel.
- New England received two grants for master classes: one with Carol Mastrodomenico and one with Mary Saunders.
- Central received a grant for a Jennifer Larmore master class.
- West-Central received a grant for a guest clinician.
- Southeast received a grant for a master class with Erie Mills.
- Southern received a grant for a master class and recitalist.



We now have seventy-four active chapters, ten more than six months ago!

I remind you that grants of up to \$200 per chapter per year (January to December) will be granted by the SNATS coordinator for worthwhile projects. This can be especially useful to jump start new chapters that may not yet have collected much money of their own. As with NATS Discretionary Funds, "The SNATS Discretionary Fund is not a primary source of funding for special events, but an ancillary one. If a program is financially successful to the extent that discretionary funds are not needed,

please notify the SNATS Coordinator immediately so that those funds can be released to another applicant."

Only SNATS chapter Presidents may apply for these funds. These forms are online. Soon, you will be able to submit them online, but for now, please snail mail them to me at least six weeks prior to your event.

During 2008, SNATS Grants were given to:

- Indiana University Jacobs School of Music for their annual New Voice Educators' Symposium.
- University of Alabama for a master class with Don Simonson

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There was money for more, but no one applied! So start applying now for 2009!

Some of the events hosted by SNATS chapters this year were:

- The University of Akron attended a masterclass being given by Paul Kiesgen on Resonance Strategies for the Male Voice at the Spring Wisconsin-NATS Chapter meeting in Madison.
- Westminster held master class on German Lieder with mezzo-soprano, Melanie Sonnenberg.
- Lee University recently hosted guest speaker, Dr. Timothy Viser, ENT.
- Indiana University Jacobs School of Music hosted its fourth annual New Voice Educators' Symposium as well as its second annual "Living Composers' Forum." This year William Bolcom came to present two days of master classes that culminated in a recital including songs from the Great American Songbook.

- Penn State hosted Dr. Arlene Shrut (Julliard) for a master class on the art of coaching entitled, "Coaching: A Sister Art."
- Virginia Tech was privileged to assist in the planning, organizing, and hosting of the Virginia NATS Conference.
- University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire hosted sessions with guest speakers on yoga and singing, creating an effective warmup routine, and vocal health.
- Central Ohio sponsored a voice pedagogy weekend with guest lecturer Richard Miller of Oberlin College.
- Georgetown College presented a musical parody concert affectionately called *All Fached-Up*.

And again, I want to thank all of those SNATS members who were in Nashville volunteering their time in exchange for free conference registration. Their time and efforts were invaluable to the success of the Conference. Looking ahead to the 2010 conference, remember that we can use many student volunteers in Salt Lake City!

he legendary Folies-Bergère, 32 rue Richer in the 9th Arrondissement, constructed as an opera house in 1869 as a venue for music hall reviews and operettas, became especially popular during the Belle Époque era. It continues to this day as a theater for song and dance reviews. In July, the 25 countries of the ICVT will meet in this historic setting for our seventh conference. Our hosts, the AFPC and EVTA, have planned a program that features a wide variety of sessions led by outstanding presenters from around the world. A list of participants can be found on the web site and it is possible to register online. There will also be poster sessions coordinated by Donald Simonson and Paolo Zedda and a meeting for journal and newsletter editors and writers chaired by our JOS editor, Richard Sjoerdsma. I will chair the ICVT Council meeting that will include two official delegates from each member association.

For our entertainment we experience a leisurely dinner cruise on the River Seine and an elegant evening of dancing at a Bal à la Française. You may also make reservations for a city bus tour and choose from a variety of walking tours to assist you in the exploration of this beloved and exciting city. The web site describes these tours as well as offering suggestions for traveling in Europe before and after the conference.

The Young Professional Program offers the opportunity for the 18 EVTA member associations to send one singer. These young singers will present a concert on the opening evening as well as singing for various voice pedagogy presentations and master classes.

Those of you who have attended ICVT conferences in past years know that it is a unique opportunity to make new friends and colleagues, to encourage a wider view of international pedagogical and musical perspectives, and to share your own ideas and experiences. These were the goals of the visionary pioneers who planned our 1987 first conference in Strasbourg and that have been sustained by our meetings in Philadelphia, Auckland, London, Helsinki and Vancouver.

Today the ICVT includes associations in Australia, Austria, Brazil, Croatia Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Hungary, Iceland, Italy, Japan, Korea, Netherlands, New Zealand, Latvia, Norway, Philippines, Poland, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, United Kingdom, United States and Canada. By the time we meet in Paris there may be some additions to this list and there will be observers from other countries who are seeking to develop their own national associations.

We offer our thanks to the AFPC committee led by Claudia Phillips and Anne Constantin, to Evelyne Koch for her vision and initial planning efforts, and to EVTA officers Norma

Enns and Scott Swope.

One of her proudest accomplishments was having the privilege to perform Bernstein's *Candide* at Lincoln Center with The New York Philharmonic. She was also featured at the Washington National Opera's 50th Anniversary Gala with Placido Domingo.

— AWARDS — 1st place

\$2,000.00 plus the composer's expenses to the NATS National Conference in Salt Lake City, July, 2010, where the premiere performance of the winning composition will be given.

2nd place \$1000.00

REQUIREMENTS - The work must be: (1) a song cycle, group of songs, or extended single song of approximately fifteen minutes in length (13-17 minutes acceptable); (2) for single voice and piano; (3) to a text written in English, for which the composer has secured copyright clearance (only text setting permission necessary); (4) composed within the last two years (after Jan. 1, 2008).

ENTRY FEE - \$30.00 for each entry (payable in U.S. funds to NATS).

ELIGIBILITY - Anyone meeting prescribed requirements.

PROCEDURE - Mail the following items to the ASCA Coordinator: (1) Three copies of the vocal-piano score(s). Copies must be neat, legible and clearly edited; manuscript pages must be stapled or bound together and should include: [a] composition title; [b] poet's name; [c] person or agency granting text setting permission; and [d] length and date of composition. THE COMPOSER'S NAME SHOULD NOT APPEAR ANY-WHERE ON THE SCORE.

- (2) Three CD or cassette recordings of composition(s). Recordings may be performance or working quality, but must be with voice and piano. Titles of compositions only must be on recordings.
- (3) A sheet of paper containing: [a] composer's name; [b] mailing address; [c] e-mail address; [d] telephone number(s); plus permission to the National Association of Teachers of Singing, Inc. to reproduce additional copies to facilitate judging and performance.

FOR RETURN OF APPLICATION MATERIAL, INCLUDE A SELF-ADDRESSED, STAMPED MAILER

Premiere performance rights without fees for a period of two years will be reserved by the National Association of Teachers of Singing.
